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arrive along with all that snow now on the Kakanuis. Gardens and Gardeners will have felt Winter had arrived very quickly after all the balmy weather of late. It made me feel I should make a start now on bedding gardens down for Winter, with compost on first then pea straw -

this will be ongoing for a while in our garden. Leaf raking has cranked up a gear now as trees shed more and more leaves and still lots to do with cutting back, Bulb planting and shifting Shrubs that have become overcrowded. Shrubs, plants and hedges will be starting to harden off to cope with the cold, so get any hedge trimming done - but don't be too hard on them. Spring is the time to take them back hard.

Hydrangea stems are hardening and flower heads are either going brown or changing into new stunning Autumn shades. Keep water up while they are looking so pretty and leave the flowers on for ages yet - especially further inland they can be left all Winter to protect new growth. If wanting to take old flower heads off on the coast, cut the stem right back to the second bud from the bottom and leave all stems that did not flower - these will be next Summers flower stems.

Leucodendrons develop rich colour as days and nights become colder - picked bracts will last in a vase for weeks, even months. Picking the bracts is a must to keep both Leucodendrons and Proteas from becoming top heavy and blowing over. They resent any form of Phosphates. Potassium and Nitrates fertiliser a little Blood and bone in Spring will keep them looking good.

On the coast, prune back **perennial Wallflowers** now to encourage new growth for a good Winter flowering. Do the same to Marguerite Daisies. Further inland, take hardwood cuttings, pot up and protect over Winter. Break up clumps of Viola like Maggie Mott and the clumping Primula Vulgaris. Plant sections with root attached into pots or trays - they will grow and clump up ready to be planted out in Spring. Both of these make lovely edging plants. Keep planting all the bulbs on offer - Ranunculus and Anemones also, for a vibrant or soft mid height colour to an early **Spring garden**.

I really enjoyed the drifts of blue from Agapanthas around town and in our garden this year, which have now finished flowering. I have started breaking up clumps of both large and dwarf varieties to fill gaps - once shifted, they need a lot of water to get them started in a new spot. Keep planting well grown evergreen Shrubs, as there still time to get them settled in before Winter.

Vegetable garden. I have mentioned growing a green crop in vacant areas of the vegetable garden - Oats is probably the best one to plant in the Autumn- it will grow in no time. Dig in while still soft and green. First timers might like to follow the green manure suggestion of using Blue Lupin as a nitrogen additive . Otherwise, use Mustard as a good soil conditioner in Spring and Summer, changing back to Oats in the Autumn. Vegetable seedlings - cover them with Strawberry net or open weave frost cloth raised above the plants while plants are small - birds will not be so interested when the plants plump out a bit. Broad Beans can be planted now. Try a little Potash in the soil just below the Bean when planted. It is said to help prevent rust. Bring Pumpkins in and store in a dry aired place. Protect the last Tomatoes and Peppers from frost - the sun is still warm enough to ripen them a little longer. When nights become really cold, vines can be dug up and hung in good light on a warm porch under cover to ripen further.

Fruit. Walnuts are falling along with the leaves. Late ripening Peaches should be picked now before the birds take them all. I have been told the Peach raised in North Otago - SWEET PERFECTION - is growing and fruiting well. A chance seedling from an orchard on the banks of the Waitaki River - strong resistance to leaf curl - bountiful and regular crops of excellent quality fruit. One to put an order in for. Feijoas seem to be plentiful right now as well. Feijoa, vanilla and fresh ginger jam on a warm scone is an Autumn treat.

Coughs and Colds

The common cold affects most people at some stage in their lives. Colds can last from 5-7 days although some symptoms, such as a cough, can last much longer. Young children get more colds than adults because their immune systems are still developing, Elderly people, and those with chronic (long term) illness, are also more likely to catch a cold easily

How do I prevent ankle sprains?

Ankle sprains often happen during rapid changes in direction in sports such as netball, soccer or rugby, or when walking on uneven ground. During these changes in direction, multiple forces act on the ankle and supporting musculature requiring the ankle to adapt, support and then aid propulsion.



The human foot and ankle unit are engineering marvels with thirty-three joints made up off twenty-six bones, thirty-three muscles (20 within the foot, 13 in the lower leg) and lots of connective tissue. When we have strong coordinated feet/ankles and appropriate footwear is worn, the risk of ankle sprains is minimal. When the ankles are weak and/or uncoordinated orthotics, strapping and/or ankle braces may be required to minimise risk of injury. It's a bit like training wheels on a kids bike - these support options can support ankle function until higher level strength and coordination are developed . Ankle strength and co-ordination are essential requirements to stay injury free during physically demanding activities.

To quickly check your quality of ankle function, try these exercises (barefoot)...

- 1. Slow and smooth ankle circles clockwise for 10 repetitions and counterclockwise for 10 repetitions. If the movement is jerky or a tremor develops at certain points through the circle then poor ankle coordination is indicated and you are at risk of ankle sprains.
- 2. Stand shoulder width apart with the feet parallel, drive the big toe into the ground and smoothly rise up into a calf raise taking 5 seconds to reach the top. Hold at the top for 5 seconds, then take 5 seconds to slowly lower yourself down. Rest and repeat 5 times. If your feet roll in or outwards and loading comes away from the big toe during any of the movement, then your ankles are weak and you are at risk of ankle sprains.
- 3. Stand on a wobble board or small cushion on one foot and have a friend throw a ball to your chest at first and progressively to your outer reach with a few high, low and wide throws. If you can balance and catch each throw and exercise 1. & 2. easily, you've got strong ankles, good coordination and with appropriate footwear your risk of ankle sprains is low!

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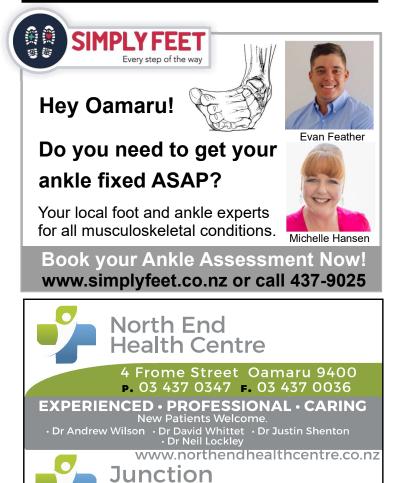

5G: Coming to a Power Pole Near YOU Soon

5G. Where does one start?

This is an issue with massive implications for all living beings.

Educated readers simply must take the time to inform themselves about it. There is a huge depth and breadth of concern that exists – globally – with regard to the impact of 5G on public health.

Yet telcos and governments everywhere are ignoring that concern and hoping you do, too.

There's a plethora of interviews, presentations, research references and recordings all over the internet, and all those non-industry-biased (which is actually most, because telcos and governments don't want your attention) that I've come across and/or studied so far are authoritative.

An Ideal Crash Course

Here's something freshly uploaded to YouTube: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=kp0_zGHH3KA.

This particular video is a series of testimonies presented to a Senate committee on Energy & Technology from a wide variety of citizens opposing the proposed roll-out of 5G in the U.S. state of Michigan. All those presenting to the committee are obviously highly educated and deeply informed, both collectively and individually.

This one presentation alone provides an ideal introductory crash course into the massive and exponentially growing concern and opposition to the bull-headed Government and industry push to roll out this dangerously untested new technology without due research or public consultation. A Deliberate & Gargantuan Misnomer

Perhaps the next most important point to make is that 5G is a gargantuan (and very deliberate) misnomer. "5G" (5th Generation wireless systems) sounds like simply the next generation up from, and an incremental improvement on, 4G . . . which was an improvement in speed performance over 3G. Not so. (The above YouTube video explains this well.) 5G is a very different technology. It's untested . . . and there have been thousands of (non-industry-funded) studies showing significant biological damage even from the far less offensive (but still highly concerning) 4G technology.

More Akin to X-Ray Technology

5G employs "millimetre wavelength" microwave radiation in a very different spectrum of frequency than that to which the human biology has ever been subjected.

In basic terms, it's more intensive, more invasive at the cellular level, penetrating any living organism in a manner more akin to x-ray technology. If I had greater space available to me, I'd go into how living in a 5G world would be like living 24/7 inside a full-body airport scanner.

- **De-Flea Treats** 3 Beef stock cube 3 ¹/₂ cups Wholemeal flour ¹/₂ cup Wheatgerm
- ½ cup Bran½ cup Linseed2/3 cup Brewers yeast

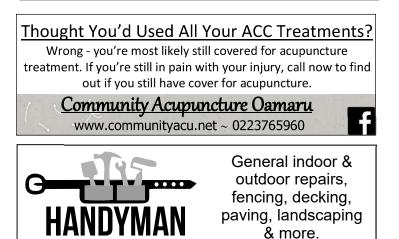

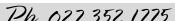

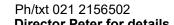
