Very dull weekend and week days so far, with rain making it even gloomier,


While rain keeps up, it gives a chance to see areas in the garden not draining well. If you have plants that are water logged, dig them up and improve where they are growing by digging the hole deep down to the clay - which is probably forming a

pan and holding the water. Break up the clay as much as you can, then put a layer of Gypsum on top of the broken clay and add at least three shovels of gravel to create a sump for water to drain into. By doing this, the plant of your choice can stay in that spot without drowning.

Pruning: Now trees have shed leaves, they are open for inspection. Many ornamental trees need attention in late Winter - branches crossing, too many branches blocking light from buds once in leaf, height and width reduction. Most trees are pruned in Winter while sap is down and insects / diseases that can potentially invade pruning cuts are dormant, as well as trees. In Winter, the worst disease is Silver Leaf, which attacks stone and pip fruit, Roses, Poplar, Willows and Escallonia hedges. It is during cold wet weather that spores are released, which can then enter the pruning cuts. During dry weather, the spores are not released and this is the reason that some prefer a Summer prune on susceptible trees and a reason to avoid pruning on cool wet

Thinning: is the removal of an entire branch. If two branches are doing the same job, this technique rids the tree of weak and diseased branches and increases light penetration and air movement. I have included diagrams of where and where not to cut for best healing practice.

Heading back: is shortening the length of a branch back to a bud or the next side branch below, as shown.



Hellebores: I have finally cut the leaves from all my Hellebores - they were infested with Greenfly Wintering over. New fresh leaves will soon appear after the beautiful flowers have popped up and flowered on their own. Ericas are flowering now - very hardy plants that are perfect ground covers, over wall spillers and great as a wide border. They usually grow only 6 - 12 inches high and spread 2 - 3 feet. Upright Erica Melanthra improved, is one of the prettiest Winter flowering small shrubs - bright pink 60cm high by 1m wide fully grown.

Leucodendrons are looking wonderful now - perfect for picking - will last for weeks in a vase. Remember not to give them rich compost or fertiliser - they prefer poor soil conditions.

Even though we are in the middle of Winter, there is plenty on offer to plant. Deciduous trees can settle in with a firm stake - Roses do best planted now. If planting evergreen Shrubs that look like they have been nursed, get them used to the outside temperatures before planting, then protect with frost cloth. Plant labels should tell you their hardiness. Rose pruning: is done once Rose wood has had enough time to harden - end of June, July even August is not too late. If unsure of how to prune Roses, the Rose Society is holding a Rose pruning demonstration at North School, 1pm on the 30th June.

Compost/mulch: This is the perfect time to supply food for plants and bulbs in the form of compost / mulch, which worms will take down to roots in time for Spring growth. Contact for a load of compost made at our local Pukeuri meat works is Gregg Ph: 0272293215. Also our Resource recovery park offers well heated mulch for keeping weeds down under trees and in rough areas of the garden. Vegetables: On the coast, Sow Broad Beans, Garlic, Shallots and Rhubarb. Colder areas, nothing much can be planted.



'Show Day' in colonial New Zealand

'Show Day' is still a highpoint of provincial calendars and few regions have been holding shows for as long as North Otago. Its 'A&P' story began in 1863 when a few big farmers formed the Northern Otago Agricultural and Pastoral Association. Their aims, 'incitement to improvement in husbandry and stock breeding; the drawing together periodically of the agricultural and pastoral classes, thereby promoting a friendly feeling between them and fostering fellowship amongst the members of each class; and the affording of opportunity to buyers and sellers of stock for ascertaining the work of each other', still hold good each February. The North Otago A& P, as it became in 1878, has missed a few shows because of war and the 1918 influenza pandemic, but most years it has staged a one- or two-day show that has brought in people, stock and machinery from far afield.

This is the A&P's third showground. The first shows were held on 'the Esplanade', a euphemism for the wasteland between Tyne Street and the sea, now covered by the buildings of the Tyne/Harbour Street historic precinct. The Association moved here in 1907 from a site on South Hill. J.M. Forrester (son of Thomas, Ōamaru's foremost architect) designed this grandstand to seat 1200; it also housed a press room, office, lunchroom, kitchen and storage facilities. The grandstand was the centrepiece of rows of cattle pens, sheep yards and pigsties that even today seem to march on forever towards the railway line. A gale blew the roof off in 1951 and shattered a lot of glass, but the old stand retains a sense of timelessness, its old wooden seats showing the traces of generations of feet and backsides. In 2012, jthe year before the association celebrated its 150th anniversary, Dulux donated paint, which volunteers applied to parts of the complex that that had not seen paint since the day it was built.

Waitaki Whitestone Geopark preferred candidate for UNESCO Global Geoparks programme

The New Zealand National Commission for UNESCO has shortlisted the 'Waitaki Whitestone Geopark' as its preferred candidate for UNESCO Global Geopark status in New Zealand.

Waitaki District Council submitted an expression of interest to become a Geopark in April this year. The proposed Geopark would encompass most of the Waitaki District. It includes well-known tourist sites such as Vanished World and Moeraki Boulders.

Waitaki district Mayor Gary Kircher says, "This is a real acknowledgment of the international uniqueness of our beautiful part of New Zealand. "The Waitaki Whitestone Aspiring UNESCO Global Geopark is not only an asset for the Waitaki and Otago, but the entire South Island, and New Zealand as a whole."

An independent Geoparks Expert Advisory Panel, established by the National Commission late last year, spent several hours carefully considering all expressions of interest.

"We were impressed by Waitaki Whitestone's well-considered, high quality application, which is already in an advanced stage of development," says Dr Geoff Hicks, Natural Sciences Commissioner, New Zealand National Commission for UNESCO, who chaired the Panel.

Waitaki District Council's Chief Executive Fergus Power led the project team that developed the Expression of Interest document. "I am immensely proud of the effort that the entire team has put into this," he says. "In just 90 days, they have created a world class document and a vision of an absolutely unique tourism offering. Success would not have been possible without the efforts of all of the volunteers (currently led by Mike Gray, the Chair of Vanished World) who have created the 'Vanished World' trail during the past 17 years. This trail lies at the heart of the geopark, and but for all of that effort, we would not have been in a position to launch our bid for UNESCO Global Geopark status."

General Manager of Tourism Waitaki, Margaret Munro, echoed Mr Power's sentiments and said that she looked forward to progressing the global geopark application. Ms Munro has departed for Greece to participate in a UNESCO Global Geoparks intensive course. She will also take the opportunity to visit UNESCO Global Geoparks in China before returning to New Zealand to assist with further implementation.

Mr Power said that Waitaki District Council will submit a letter of intent to UNESCO by 1 July and will then be required to develop a full dossier by the end of November, which will be assessed by an expert team in Paris.

There are currently 140 UNESCO Global Geoparks in 38 countries. If Waitaki Whitestone is ultimately successful it will be the first in Australasia and would most likely gain UNESCO Global Geoparks status in 2019.
