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Some good frost this week to harden wood - but with the mild weather we have been experiencing, there are definite signs of Spring. Once plants have moved into the first stages of budding, they should continue to bud up during the sunny Winter days. I am at the walking about the garden stage in my recovery, noticing Jonquils, sweet little Snowdrops,

delightful Violets and very pretty Winter Roses (Hellebores). All Sasanqua Camellias are in full bloom - so still plenty of interest in a coastal mid Winter garden.

Daphne Bholua is in flower now, also wafting lovely fragrance around this garden. This Daphne will never let you down and has the bonus of Winter flowering. Daphne Bholua is a must for cold inland gardens, being derived from Nepal's high altitude regions, but unfortunately resents exposed coastal conditions.

Pruning of Trees and large Shrubs is still on going, as well as some older Roses and sheltered mature Hydrangeas - cut back Hydrangea canes that have flowered at the second bud from the bottom and leave all canes that did not flower because these will be the new season's flowers. In colder areas, I would leave Hydrangeas until they really start bursting bud and same for newly planted young Hydrangeas leave until closer to Spring.

This is a good time to reduce the width of gardens trimming grass edges with a line trimmer, tends to increase garden width slightly each year, to the point where after a number of years, lawn needs to be increased at the garden edge by filling in back to the original line with sifted soil, then resowing grass in Spring. Garden borders do not need to be wide to give a colourful display - wide borders mean digging, unnecessary work and expense filling them. If you have borders getting choked with clumps of bulbs, leaving not a lot of room for other plantings, put a sharp spade through the clumps now and remove half and plant elsewhere before bulbs put on too much growth.

A few trips to the Waireaka Valley Lions Club sawdust and sheep manure stand are made here now. Volunteers clean out calving sheds and under shearing sheds to keep the stand topped up for keen gardeners. I use the sawdust on some garden pathways. Sawdust can also be used on wet gardens as a weed suppressant and help to absorb excess moisture - but never on dry gardens. I use sheep manure on the compost heaps, the vegetable garden and around the Roses when horse manure is not at hand.

Vegetables: In cold areas start raising vegetable seeds for Spring planting in glass houses or under glass or plastic with ventilation spaces to circulate air and stop seeds going mouldy.

On the coast, plant seedling plants that are now on offer along with Garlic cloves. Gardeners have long known the advantages of growing Comfrey, I been reading up on it again, it is such a useful plant and if you can get your hands on some I suggest you plant some root sections in an area of your garden where it can spread (away from ornamential gardens) and send it's roots very deep down into the soil to tap into much needed nutrients. Comfrey is fast growing, high in potassium and can be cut back again and again. I have listed below some uses for Comfrey around the garden.

1. Compost activator - add to your compost bin to heat up the decomposing materials and enriches the compost.

2. Put a handful of Comfrey leaves into a bucket of rainwater and let them rot down for around 6 weeks, to give you a rich liquid fertilizer for plants.

3. Lay Comfrey leaves in a Potato trench and leave for 3 days prior to planting seed potatoes, to give them a Potassium rich boost of fertiliser.

4. Use as a Comfrey leaf mulch around plants, by layering leaves around the stems of plants - Potassium will slowly be released to the plants as the leaves break down – Great for Tomatoes, Beans and Fruit bushes.

5. Use wilted leaves as a nutrient rich Chicken feed. *Cheers, Linda* 

## Campylobacter

Campylobacter is a bacterium that can be found in raw chicken meat, offal, raw milk and raw milk products, and other foods. Find out how Campylobacter can make you ill, and ways to avoid infection.

Symptoms of Campylobacter infection

Campylobacter causes the gastrointestinal illness

campylobacteriosis when it colonises the intestine.

If you become infected with Campylobacter, you are likely to become ill within 2 to 5 days, although sometimes it can take up to 10 days. Symptoms include:

- muscle pain
- headaches and fever
- diarrhoea (can be bloody)
- abdominal pain.

The illness lasts about 5 days.

#### How you can be exposed to Campylobacter

There are many ways you can be exposed to Campylobacter. The bacteria have been found in poultry, raw milk, offal such as chicken livers, and a variety of other foods. Besides handling raw chicken in your own kitchen, the most commonly reported ways to be exposed are from:

- eating bought food for example, takeaways and at restaurants
- contact with farm animals
- drinking untreated water
- contact with faecal matter
- 'recreational water' like rivers and lakes.

You may also be exposed through contact with pets, birds, other animals, infected people, soil or objects contaminated by animals.

#### How you can avoid Campylobacter infection

You can reduce your risk of campylobacteriosis by using good hygiene practices when buying, transporting, storing and preparing food. In particular, avoid transferring bacteria from one food to another (cross-contamination), especially to foods that will not be cooked, like salads. Utensils, hands and kitchen surfaces can all transfer bacteria.

#### Follow these rules to keep safe:

- Wash and dry hands every time raw chicken is handled.
- Properly wrap raw chicken and parts including thawed meat to prevent drip contamination.
- Store raw chicken and parts below ready-to-eat food in the refrigerator.
- Ensure any frozen chicken and parts are thoroughly defrosted before cooking.
- Use a separate chopping board and utensils for raw chicken and parts and another set for cooked food.
- Pre-cook chicken before barbecuing.
- Cook chicken meat and chicken livers thoroughly to one of the following temperature/time combinations at the thickest part – 65 degrees Celsius for 10 minutes; 70 degrees Celsius for 2 minutes, or 75 degrees Celsius for 15 seconds.

#### Do not wash:

raw chicken carcasses and parts as this helps spread Campylobacter to other items such as hands, clothes, other food, and contact surfaces.

## History of The Oamaru Information Centre I.C.

Most Oamaruvians assume the Oamaru Information Centre has always been at the south end of Thames Street!!! In actual fact it travelled a rocky road to its present location. The idea of setting up an IC in Oamaru was the brainchild of the North Otago Progress league which was made up of 3 committees of volunteers to promote Tourism, Industry and Primary Production in the North Otago area.

Thanks to the Oamaru Borough Council, through the efforts of a motivated Councillor, Mr Vish Miernicki, the first IC was located in an upstairs room at the Opera House building. With no available funds, we had to "beg, borrow and steal" from local Travel Agents enough brochures and posters to make the bare room a little more inviting!

The Oamaru Information Centre was born on 1st April 1978 when I, as Secretary of the N.O.P.L. opened the doors for the first time. I was paid a small secretary's honorarium so was only able to carry out the duties of an Information Officer on a part-time basis.

Our advertising consisted of a big heavy wooden sandwich board!! One of the kind Council staff would stagger out to stand the board on the footpath outside the Opera House!! This would invite visitors to town to find their way upstairs to discover what was available for a stranger in town. They had to be pretty intrepid to do this!

So the Information Centre was virtually run by the Tourist Promotion Committee of the North Otago League which had Mr Ito Tsukigawa as its Convenor

We always knew the Information Centre was in a bad situation, so for the 1980 Christmas period an information caravan was set up on the street beside where Countdown is now situated (the original pie cart site). We were lucky, through the Labour Department's PEP Scheme, to employ a young student to run the caravan. This proved so successful that it was run again in the same place the following Christmas period with 2 students.

However the big breakthrough for the League was when Mr Miernicki managed to organise for the Information Centre to shift to a room in the Centennial Building in Severn Street. This meant we were finally on the main road with a welcoming place which had easy access for the traveller/visitor. The building also had a kitchen and toilet amenities.

The last President of the Progress League, Mr Ernie Freeman, envisaged tourists staying overnight in Oamaru and visiting the blue penguins down in the harbour area but, sadly, like a lot of visionaries, he didn't live to see his dream realised.

We struggled financially as with my honorarium I could only run the centre part time as I was also committed to the other League portfolios. We were again fortunate that the Labour Department was running a scheme to assist young people into the workforce. We had a succession of 4 very willing motivated young women to help us out so the numbers using the Centre climbed steadily.

Nothing lasts forever so when a new group, North Otago Promotion Committee, with access to government funding, ousted the North Otago Progress League they took over the running of the Oamaru Information Centre on 1st July 1987. Although this was sad for me I did at least have the satisfaction of knowing I helped establish a valuable asset for the town and make the road smoother for the Oamaru Information Centre!!



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## RECIPE OF THE WEEK KUMARA AND LAMB CAKES

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## Ingredients

500g Kumara, Peeled, cut into cubes 3 Thep Olive oll

- 1 Onion, diced finely
- 2 cloves Garlic, sliced
- 1 Tosp Grated Ginger
- 2 tsp Soy sauce
- 1 Tbsp Oyster Sauce 1 Cup corlander, shopped
- 2 Cups lamb, cooked shredded
- 1 serving flour, for dusting 1 serving sweet chill sauce, to serve

## Directions

Place kumara in a pot of salled water and cock for 10 minutes until soft. Mash roughly with a fork, then cool.

Heat 1 tablespoon of oil in a small part to a medium heat. Add onion and garlis, cooking for 3 or 4 minutes until soft. Sfir through the ginger.

Place kumars in a large bowl. Add onion mix, soy, oyster sauce and conander, combining well. Stir through stredded lamb, season with salt and pepper. Divide moture into eight. Shape into even-sized pattles

Heat remaining oil in a frying pan. Dust the pattles in flour. Fry for 3 or 4 minutes each side until golden brown. Serve hot with a side satad and sweet chill.

#### **Organics Pass Half Billion Mark**

The NZ organic sector is now worth over half a billion dollars, prompting claims from industry leaders it has gone mainstream. Domestic and global demand for NZ organics saw the sector grow 30% since 2015 and is now worth \$600m, according a new report from Organics Actearoa NZ. It shows a domestic market worth \$245 million per annum with eight out of 10 Kiwi shoppers buying organic food and groceries at least on a fortnightly basis. Exports of primary food products, wine and beauty care products grew 42% to \$355 million per annum. This represents a tiny percentage of a surging organic global market where organic food sales alone were worth A85b and growing at 10.5% a year. Europe, North America and Australia continued to be the sector's primary export destinations. comprising 69% of all exports. The next step for the sector was to build a national organic strategy to harness the mood for change and step up to become a leader in organic production and marketing. (Stuff)

#### Record Milk Production On Horizon

NZ milk production may grow to a record of nearly 23 billion litres in the 2018/19 season, bolstered by a favourable milk price and adequate feed reserves. and assuming normal weather conditions, according to Rabobank's Emma Higgins. She forecasts the nation's year-on-year milk production will grow 2% for 2018/19, the year that started on June 1. Given Fonterra's estimate that its own milk collections will increase 1.5% year on year, national milk supply could increase as much as 4%. "If realised, this will be a record for NZ milk production," she said adding milk output would be 872,000 tonnes higher than the previous season. Rabobank expects 2017/18 milk production to match that of 2016/17, resulting in 21.4 million tonnes of milk. Meanwhile, a stalling in the pace of milk supply growth across the world's seven main dairy exporting regions in recent months offers reasons for a more bullish market. A NZ milk price of \$6.80 per kg of milk solids is now within reach for 2018/19, she said. (NZ Herald)
